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# THE ONOMATOPOEIA

An onomatopoeia (ah-nuh-ma-tuh-pee-uh) is word that is spelled to mimic a sound. "Meow" is a word that imitates the sound a cat makes. "Achoo" mimics the noise of a sneeze. You might see the word "kaboom" to demonstrate the sound of an explosion.

Onomatopoeia are everywhere, but you see them a lot in relation to comic books, animal noises, musical sounds, body noises, and weather.

# Chitty Chitty Bang Bang BY IAN FLEMING

The whole title of this book is one long onomatopoeia. Chitty Chitty Bang Bang is a book about a magical, flying car, and the title is an **ONOMATOPOEIA** of the sound it makes: the *chitty chitty* of the car starting up and the *bang bang* when it backfires.

The author of *Chitty Chitty Bang Bang*, Ian Fleming, is the same author as the James Bond books. Unfortunately, Ian Fleming died before the book was published. When the book was made into the famous Disney film, one of Fleming's best friends wrote the script. That friend was none other than Roald Dahl, the author of *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, *Matilda*, and so many more classics.

# DOWN ON THE FARM **CLASSICS**



Chapter books set on a farm often feature talking animals. Of course, when we read animal dialogue, it's written in English so we can understand what they are saying. When we give animals human characteristics (like talking in English) it is called **PERSONIFICATION**.

However, when the human characters in the book hear the animals "talk," they simply hear the animals making their regular sounds -- neighs and moos and clucks -- or ONOMATOPOEIA.


#### RABBIT HILL BY ROBERT LAWSON



## COCK-A-DOODLE-HUH?

Animals in different countries have different words for the noises they make.

Of course, the animals themselves sound the same; a cat in Japan sounds the same as a cat in the U.S. However, the words we use to describe that sound - the ONOMATOPOEIAS are different. We say that a cat in the U.S. says "Meow," while in Japan it says "nyaa." Here's a few more examples of animal sounds from around the world.
